





As I sit and write this report, the Bentley Fire Department had just returned from its 100th call of the year. That may not be too impressive for a big city department, but for our small group of volunteers, this is a significant number of calls, especially with over two months remaining in the year. It is extremely gratifying to be able to work with such a dedicated group of individuals who are willing to take so much time out of their work and personal lives to serve our community!

Last report, I made the mistake of writing that things had been unusually quiet, with only 16 calls from August 20th-September 16th. Things have definitely picked up

since then, as we have responded to 16 calls since then, which included the following: On September 17, we had a very short drive in our fire trucks to respond to a motor vehicle collision on Highway 12 and 44th street. A vehicle turning left onto the highway had been struck by a westbound

vehicle. By the time we arrived, three children in the left turning vehicle had been taken from the scene by relatives. The remaining occupants of both vehicles were assessed by EMS, but none required

transport to the hospital.

On September 22, crews responded to a medical assist. The patient was quickly loaded onto the ambulance to be transported to a nearby hospital. This was the first of three calls that day. Later that afternoon, we responded to a fire alarm at the curling rink, which turned out to be a non-emergency. Finally, firefighters were dispatched to an RV on fire on Highway 20, north of town. The RV was a total loss, and firefighters worked quickly to both extinguish the vehicle, and knock

down the grass fire that had been ignited. The Town Library's smoke alarms went off in the wee hours of the morning on September 24. Responding members were unable to contact a keyholder, but since there was no sign of smoke or fire in the building, they did not forcibly enter the building to investigate further.

On October 9, the department was toned out to a collision between a motorcycle and a grain truck. The motorcyclist was transported by EMS to a nearby hospital and firefighters remained on scene to control traffic and assist with the clean-up. A car that had lost control and crashed into the Curling Rink brought us out on October 16. The driver was uninjured, but there was significant damage to both their vehicle and the building. Remember, kids: you may think you possess the stunt driving skills of Travis Pastrana, but enthusiasm doesn't replace actual ability

This is the time of year when we see some agricultural equipment fires and on October 17, it was an excavator that caught fire south of town. The fire was knocked down quickly, but the machine suffered significant damage. Our last interesting call was on October 21, when the fire department was dispatched for an Aircraft Emergency. A caller told 9-1-1 dispatchers that she had seen an airplane fall from the sky and crash into the ground between Bentley and Sylvan Lake. Multiple RCMP units and fire departments from Bentley, Eckville and Sylvan Lake spent some considerable time looking for the crash site. STARS Air Ambulance also started making its way to the area to assist in the search. Ultimately, nothing was found, and everyone went home. On what is, I am sure, a completely unrelated note, the Orionid Meteor Shower was near its peak that morning.

The rest of the calls for this reporting period were the usual assortment of false alarms and smoke investigations. Before I sign off, I would like to acknowledge and thank Drayton Bussiere for his years of service as our Lacombe County Fire Chief. Chief Bussiere was a tremendous asset to the departments in our area and he will be missed. We wish him all the best in his new role as Red Deer County Chief.



BYLAW NO. 1397/23

SOUTHEAST BENTLEY AREA STRUCTURE PLAN

Lacombe County and the Town of Bentley have partnered to prepare for and facilitate future commercial and industrial development on the lands southeast of Bentley, within Lacombe County. The main product of this initiative is the Southeast Bentley Area Structure Plan, which outlines potential areas commercial and industrial development can be considered and land use policies that would apply if development is to occur.

The draft Plan incorporates feedback expressed by the public. To view the draft Plan and public engagement summary report, please visit the County's website. Lacombe County Council has scheduled this Public Hearing to hear from the public before the Plan is considered for final adoption.

Anyone wishing to comment on the proposed bylaw will have an opportunity to do so at a public hearing. If you are unable to attend the hearing, written submissions can be made to the County. Volunteerism is difficult all over the country and especially after coming through the pandemic, but we want to let people know Bentley, the place you choose to *BE!* is open, in business and welcoming volunteers to the many opportunities we have for people to get involved.

Please be reminded; in our process of future plans, we have been spending much time planning the possibilities and requirements for years down the road. Following Lacombe Councils recent first reading this process is now heading to the public meeting. This planning process can be seen on our web site or pickup a notice of the County/town process in our town office. The purpose is to have an agreement first with the county and then the town to apply for annexation to the province for this to be our direction for future expansion and annexation for a controlled commercial, industrial, and green reserve land. There will be this public meeting at the Lacombe County Chamber on November 14 for the Southeast, Bentley Area Structure Plan. *Please note this is not a process to take land from owners. This is to put Councils and public agreed plans in place for future development and growth. This being for such a time as a developer or developers seek to purchase the land from the owner interested in selling and bring needed development to Bentley. People will be allowed to share their concerns, ideas and wished either in person or in writing.

I would encourage you to access our web site. Everything we as council are looking at doing is there in detail as we move forward. You are also always welcome to attend our public council meetings.

Special Needs Assistance for Seniors

If you are a senior who qualifies for assistance via the Seniors Special Needs Assistance Program, you may be eligible to be reimbursed for a variety of things. If you are not sure what this program is, please contact 403.748.2160. Copies of the program booklet can be printed for you, or you can view it on the internet here https://open.alberta.ca/publications/6756730.

Assistance Program has a reimbursement for light housekeeping and/or yard work with criteria for access. If you qualify for this program you can engage whomever you wish to clean as long as you have a receipt and they are not a family member. This is a secondary item under the program, income levels are below. Additionally, to qualify you must have a doctor's letter if you are under 80 and no one else living in the household can do the housekeeping. Over 80, there is no medical criteria.

Community Services often receives inquiries regarding light housekeeping services/yard assistance.

We cannot refer potential house cleaners, snow shovelers or yard help. Doing so, without vetting or staffing a position, leaves the Town potentially Benefit year

The School Resource Officer program, consisting of Lacombe County Community Peace Officer Dave Lahucik, Const. Michelle Grovet, Const. Lenny Wells, Const. Jeff Hewitt, in partnership with WCPS' Director of Safe

and Caring Schools, Barb Reaney, has consistently strived to create a nurturing and safe environment within the school district. Their commitment to this cause goes beyond the badge; they have become mentors, friends, and guardians of the well-being of the students they serve.

It's about fostering positive relationships to ensure that these students have the knowledge and support they need to navigate the challenges of today's world."

Wolf Creek's SROs are currently stationed in Ponoka, Lacombe, Lacombe County, and Blackfalds, each serving their respective areas within the community. Lacombe County partnered with WCPS on the School Resource Officer Program in 2019 to work WCPS schools in Alix, Bentley, Clive and Eckville.

The Friends of Education Award was presented to Wolf Creek and its SROs at the monthly meeting of ASBA Zone 4 reps in September, hosted by Wolf Creek in Ponoka. The Wolf
